This workbook is yours to keep. No-one is marking it, so use it in your own way to explore what the world of work might look like for YOU.





As you saw in the video, work in Transport and Highways involves running public transport, educating the public and keeping people safe.

Whichever role you find interesting in Transport and Highways, maintaining safety will always be a part of your responsibilities. You could be educating people about road safety in communities, maintaining and improving transport structures for use, or even managing projects that improve transport links for your local area.

While knowing how to maintain safety will be something you learn throughout your career journey, there are skills you can develop and show you have in your CV that will help.

Some examples are:

- Communication
- Attention to detail
- Problem solving
- Leadership
- Being level-headed (keeping calm and being able to work under pressure)

Many people have misconceptions (believing something that is untrue) about what working in social care is really like. Let's bust some myths and discover the range of careers waiting in Social Care.

Social Worker

Outreach Support Worker



This role will support people with mental health conditions and/or addictions, and their physical health. These could include people who struggle to take part in activities that matter to them. They will work on the strengths and difficulties the person has and help them gain independence with day to day activities.

This role will work and communicate with service users (people who use the support) and those who help them such as health professionals, care homes and agencies, and their families to support their care situation. They help to find available help, check in over the phone or through visits, and follow a care plan and report on their progress.

This role will identify and assess a person's personal support needs. They will work with vulnerable people and help find solutions to their problems to protect them and/or help them live independently. This can include children and their families/carers, adults and the elderly.

This role works with people who are 'hard to reach'. This can include young people, those in rural areas, people with disabilities, and ethnic groups. These are people who may have more barriers to getting support, and this role's job is to remove this barrier. It includes lots of work in the community.

Legal & Licensing

Careers in law are a very popular choice in the UK. Is this something you are interested in?

Law covers a range of different topics and you can specialise in a subject if you decide to pursue law as a career. As you saw in the video, licensing is a big part of legal work for local government.

Councils all have a big part to play and are introducing ways to help reduce climate change.



Finance Procurement & HR

Labour Market Information (LMI) shows you data about the current economic and employment situation. This means you can see:

- Weekly pay
- Annual pay
- The hours you may work each week
- Hourly pay
- Contraction or growth this estimates whether the industry is predicted
 to grow bigger or get smaller. If the percentage is negative, then there
 may be fewer job opportunities in the future as the industry is
 contracting. If the percentage is positive, then more job opportunities
 are going to appear as the industry is growing.
- Replacement this is how many people are predicted to retire and leave the industry. Lots of people leaving the industry means jobs will open up as these employees need to be replaced with new workers.

Look at this LMI data for a Finance Officer.

Note: LMI changes all the time so this data is just an example. For this activity, please work with the data provided. It is correct for October 2023.

Remember that this is estimated for the industry. The actual amount of hours/pay will depend on where you work, but is likely to be very similar.



Transport & Highways

Social care

Occupational Therapist	This role will support people with mental health conditions and/or addictions, and their physical health. Legal & Licensing

a) Licences are important because of... safety! They're all about protecting YOU. They make sure that businesses operate safely and cover all types of things from transport to food to buildings.

b)

Taxi licensing	Drivers and private hire vehicles must be inspected and reach certain standards. This includes a medical exam, DBS check and practical driving test to ensure the driver is 'fit and proper' for safe transport.
Animal licensing	People who want to breed or sell, open a zoo, provide paid care, etc must meet welfare guidance and legislation, and may be awarded a star rating.

Entertainment, food and drink licensing	Businesses must have licences to play music (including live music), sell alcohol to those legally allowed to drink it, and must meet hygiene regulations.
Trade and industry licencing	You must have a licence to distribute printed material in certain parts of counties and towns. This will include leaflets and posters.

Environment & Sustainability

a) All of these things produce carbon except for trees. Trees produce forms of carbon during their life, but they are best known for their ability to store carbon and release oxygen, which is why they are so important!

Things like buses, trams, cars, farming and building all produce carbon, and it might be something you hear about a lot in the news. There is a lot of work to be done towards reducing climate change, but councils introduce new ways of working and regulations that allow us to use transport, build homes, and farm produce in a more environmentally friendly way.

b) These are all ways to reduce carbon emissions except for coal. Coal produces gases like carbon dioxide when burned, which is why its use is being reduced over the years and more sustainable ways of heating homes are being fitted.

Recycling centres encourage people to dispose of their waste responsibly and it can be sorted into the correct categories to be recycled. Electric charging points make fueling electric vehicles (which emit fewer greenhouse gases than petrol or diesel) more accessible for drivers. Pedestrianising reduces the amount of cars in specific areas, and makes it a safer place for people to walk and cycle.

- c) All of these skills are important for environmental careers, so it doesn't matter which skills you chose as the most important as long as you know why you chose it. Here are some examples to help you:
 - Critical thinking this skill will help you weigh up different sides of arguments using facts and evidence to choose the judgement that will have the best impact.
 - Creativity this skill will help you come up with innovative new ideas and solutions to climate change problems.
 - Technical skills these skills aren't essential for every role, but if you
 want a career where you get to do hands-on work or get involved in
 more scientific work, you'll need specific skills. You can gain these by
 learning through an environmental degree, apprenticeship and training.
 - Communication knowing how to share your ideas with others and doing it clearly is key!
 - Problem solving this skill will need your creativity and critical thinking
 to help solve short term and long term environmental issues (this
 means things that can be changed right now and things that can be
 changed over time).
 - Organisation and planning you'll be working towards reaching a climate change strategy which means planning and organisation is essential. You could find yourself managing sustainability projects that help reach the net zero goal.
